From the Pastor's Desk

My dear Trinity family,

What a tumultuous month September 2017 has been! As one recounts stories from national and international headlines, it almost seems surreal! What a terrible season of the loss of human lives, homes, facilities and dreams!!!

This has been a time in which a lot has happened in our world. Harvey and Irma have devastated life and property on their force-filled paths. It is not hard to observe that it will be a long, arduous path to restoration and rebuilding. One must not forget that while physical reconstruction, insurance and issues of liabilities will consume time and attention, the hardest part may be for those who deal with deep anxiety, fear and plain horror as they relive memories of fighting water in closed spaces, watching a loved one disappear or witnessing their safe spaces and world being torn apart by wind and water. While we were gathering in worship on Sunday the 10th of September (in quiet and safe New Cumberland), media reports had it that about 6.3 million people had been ordered evacuated that week in the state of Florida on account of Hurricane Irma. Not to mention those who lost access to power in their homes and facilities – and the families that lost their loved ones. We have also seen heart-wrenching pictures/scenes from Texas, the Caribbean, Cuba and Florida. Not to forget the contrast of the wild fires in the West.

Apart from the hurricanes, there was an 8.1 magnitude quake that struck off the Southern coast of Mexico. As I write this pastoral letter, in South Asia more than a quarter million people have fled the country of Myanmar (Burma) because of violence. In two weeks about 270 thousand Rohingya people moved from Myanmar to the neighboring country of Bangladesh. Once again in South Asia, over 1000 people lost their lives and millions have been affected this summer because of floods in Nepal, India and Bangladesh. America and the nations of the world continue to keep their eyes on North Korea as uncertainty prevails in the relationships.

On another note, September 11th brought back the horror and the memories of a day that modern America will never be able to forget. It will always be a day in which innumerable American families will go back in their memories and remember (amidst tears and sorrow)

how the events of “9/11” altered their lives forever. We stop to remember them and the heroic America that came together in rescue operations as people worked tirelessly and sacrificially to save lives - and in those acts solemnly upheld the spirit of the red, white and blue. The hand of terror could not restrain the feet of a resilient America! You proved once again to the world that this indeed is the land of the free and the home of the brave. I believe you will prove it again now.

While we try to process what has taken place in the last few weeks, it is possible that we have faced our doubts, fears or felt anger, frustration or even wondered where God is in all of this? If we who are at this distance can feel the pain, how much more would those who have actually been in the heart of the crisis? In his

book, Reason for God, respected pastor and author Dr. Timothy Keller writes, “A faith without some doubts is like a human body without any antibodies in it. People who blithely go through life too busy or indifferent to ask hard questions about why they believe as they do will find themselves defenseless against either the experience of tragedy or the probing questions of a smart skeptic.”

So, if you have wondered about what has been happening in the world, you will not be amiss to address the questions or even doubts of your heart and soul. While the skeptic may walk away from tragedy triumphantly declaring the absence or death of God, the seeker may ponder other questions. For instance, if the presence of evil implies the absence of God, would not the presence of good by that very logic imply the presence of God? If so, how can one walk away from the millions of good gifts we receive on this planet without pondering the source? From sunrises to golden crops to the delights of the oceans, the Appalachian trail or the beauty of those majestic Redwood trees- we are gifted a life of joy, wonder and potential satisfaction. Deeper still are the amazing gifts of human emotions and relationships. The joy of holding your first baby, the pride in a parent’s eyes on graduation day, the twinkle in the eye of lovers on their wedding day or the strength of family surrounding us even at the point of death. To assume that all of those gifts and bonds would be engrained into our Universe by the mere outworking of chance, time and matter would require a substantial and unreal leap of faith, wouldn’t it? To assume that the coming together of a ‘finely tuned Universe’ wherein elements like atmospheric pressure, oxygen levels and the gravitational force have been adjusted to a perfect balance for making life possible, happened by sheer chance would be a far stretch too, wouldn’t it? It was Fred Hoyle who is known for his Boeing 747 illustration who observed, “A junkyard contains all the bits and pieces of a Boeing-747, dismembered and in disarray. A whirlwind happens to blow through the yard. What is the chance that after its passage a fully assembled 747, ready to fly, will be found standing there?” (Fred Hoyle : "The Intelligent Universe", 1983, page 19)

The Bible opens with the words of Genesis 1:1 : In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. The cause behind creation was not impersonal forces but a personal God!

As we look at the offerings of various worldviews and religions, it will become evident that Christianity stands distinctly apart not only in its creation narrative but also in its redemption narrative. The Bible not only presents a beginning to the Universe, it also tells the story of humankind’s wandering away from grace and the consequences of breaking lose from the safe-space of a relationship with the Maker. If the Book left us with the start and the problem, we would be adrift on the high seas of nothingness and nowhere! But God pursues his lost creation and sought to redeem us and the planet. In stark contrast to the gods of some religions who seek to wipe

out evil and evil doers, the God of the Bible addresses sin while providing for the redemption of sinners. Not only does he do so, he also allows himself completely into our predicament and takes our penalty upon himself. That is not just amazing. As we continue to process what has happened lately, those of us who are looking at remedies through the eyes of faith will certainly continue to be on our knees in prayer. We are a world in the need of mercy! It is hard to imagine how far we have moved from our divine anchor as a human society. I recall how one of you brought my attention lately to the words of the Lord Jesus as he described the signs of the times, “Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be great earthquakes, famines and pestilences in various places, and fearful events and great signs from heaven.” Luke 21: 10, 11

As we continue to reflect we must not forget that we are also living in times where it appears we have come too close as a planet to the edge of an ecological brink and risk a precipitous fall – even as the events of the last few weeks have highlighted.

This is also a time of introspection for us as a world. It is a time in which I will be wise in asking myself some questions. Questions like, am I allowing the pain of those who are hurting because of the Hurricanes and other tragedies to become a burden in my heart? Am I allowing those burdens to turn into prayers, checks, gifts – and anything that will help the cause of rebuilding life and hope? Does the spiritual condition of my fellow human beings and their need for God move my heart and inspire me to be a testimony and witness for Jesus? Am I taking note that the little things that I can do like turning off light switches, air conditioning, water faucets, my car's engine or choosing to use cloth/ paper bags instead of non-biodegradable material might contribute a significant mite to safeguarding the environment? Are some of us being challenged to do more in terms of advocacy, education, writing, speaking and challenging our fellow-citizens to come on board in this fight for our planet?

As people who are called Methodists, we are grateful for the work of the United Methodist Committee on relief and our own locally situated "Mission Central". I thank each of you for your prayers, concern and generous gifts made available through the offerings we received on Sunday, September 10th. You are an amazing group of people here at Trinity.

I wish to close this letter with a short story I received in an e mail forward from one of you: Today, after my 72 -hour shift at the fire station, a woman ran up to me at the grocery store and gave me a hug. When I tensed up, she realized I didn't recognize her. She let go with tears of joy in her eyes and the most sincere smile and said; "On 9-11-2001, you carried me out of the World Trade Center."

Who knows? Your little acts of kindness and love in Jesus name may one day result in someone saying, "Thank you for carrying me out of my tough times!"

May God grant you his peace and strength!

Let me close by saying that we eagerly look forward to seeing you at Camp Hill United Methodist Church for our church retreat on October 28th. We will especially miss those of you who will not be able to join us on account of your health. Your gift to us will be your prayers for the retreat.

CROP HUNGER WALK
(COMMUNITIES RESPONDING TO OVERCOME POVERTY)

This year's annual CROP Walk will begin on the steps of the Harrisburg Capitol, N. Third Street, on Sunday, October 15th, 2017 at 1:30. Trinity has been a CROP Walk participant since at least 1980 (I know because that was my first walk!). But did you know that many consider the CROP Hunger Walk the "granddaddy" of all charity walks. The first recorded walk was held on October 16th, 1969 in Bismarck, ND. One thousand people participated, and they raised \$25,000 to help stop hunger! Several other CROP Hunger Walks occurred soon after and before long communities around the country were organizing these walks to aid in ending hunger both at home and around the world. Today, well over 2,000 communities across the country join in more than 1,600 CROP Walks sponsored by Church World Service each year. This year marks the 46th year of the Harrisburg CROP Walk!

I have seen some changes throughout the years as I've walked. Routes have been altered for safety reasons, the walk has been shortened a bit, and 3 years ago the walk was moved from City Island to HACC for the first time. Then last year the route changed once again, moving back to the city, beginning on the steps of the Capitol building and weaving around the city from church to church. But one change has concerned me more than the changes in venue. The number of walkers has greatly diminished. When I first began walking, Trinity had as many as 20+ participants. The last time we walked we had 6. And this seems to be the case with other community groups as well. I do need to stress that Trinity has remained consistent and very generous in their giving, and donations are ultimately what is needed. But I would love some company! I am reminded of a story that has always kept me walking:

A young African boy who had been greatly blessed by a missionary who had come to his village wanted to do something special to thank her. He knew of a beach where he would be able to find the most beautiful shells. So he set off on his quest to find one. Upon receiving this beautiful gift, the missionary asked where he had found such an exquisite shell. When he told her of the distance he had traveled, she said, "But that is so far away!" His reply – "Long walk, part of gift!"

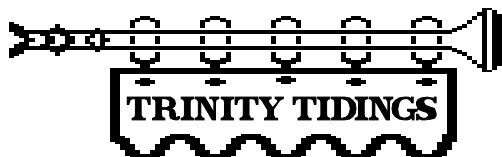

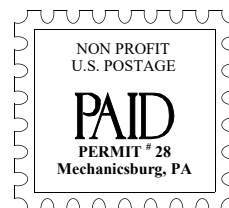
